

2016 PCG Seed Cost Calculator Now Available

The 2016 version of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Seed Cost Calculator is ready and available for download from the PCG website at <http://www.plainscotton.org>.

The PCG seed cost calculator is an interactive Microsoft Excel spreadsheet that allows producers to calculate an estimated cost per acre, for both seed and technology, based on published suggested retail prices.

The calculator has become a popular tool among producers interested in comparing seed and technology prices as they work to finalize their cotton variety selections.

The 2016 version of the spreadsheet includes listings for more than 90 conventional, Roundup Ready FLEX, XtendFlex, GlyTol, Bollgard II, TwinLink, and Widestrike varieties, including numerous stacked gene versions of these technologies that will be available for sale in West Texas in 2016.

New AgriLife Extension Entomologist Fills South Plains Post

Texas A&M University's department of entomology and the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service entomology project group announced the hiring of Dr. Suhas Vyavhare as the new AgriLife Extension cotton entomologist serving the South Plains.

Vyavhare started Feb. 1 and is headquartered at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center at Lubbock. The center is headquarters for AgriLife Extension's 20-county South Plains District that Vyavhare serves.

Dr. Charles Allen, state integrated pest management coordinator at San Angelo, said Vyavhare earned a bachelor's in agriculture from Mahatma Phule Agricultural University, Rahuri, India, and a master's in plant, soil and environmental science from West Texas A&M University at Canyon. He then earned a doctorate in entomology from Texas A&M University at College Station.

Previously, he was a postdoctoral research associate at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center at Beaumont, Allen said. While there, Vyavhare was in charge of implementing, managing and supervising applied research addressing entomological issues in soybeans, rice, sugarcane and sorghum. He also designed and conducted various field trials evaluating performance of crop protection products.

Prior to working in Beaumont, Vyavhare was a teaching assistant in the department of entomology at Texas A&M.

"We are looking forward to watching Dr. Vyavhare continue on the path of excellence he has charted thus far in his career as he takes on the responsibility of working with AgriLife Extension agents and farmers to help them manage cotton insects on the Texas High Plains," Allen said.

Ports-to-Plains, LEDA to Host Energy and Ag Summit

Friday, February 19, 2016 Information from Ports-to-Plains

The Ports-to-Plains Alliance and the Lubbock Economic Development Alliance will co-host the 2016 Ports-to-Plains Energy and Ag Summit March 30-31 at the Arbor Hotel and Conference Center in Lubbock.

"This is quite a volatile time for energy and agriculture, which are the industries that are critical to the economies throughout the Ports-to-Plains Corridor region," Ports-to-Plains President Michael Reeves said. "That is why we think it is so important for business and community leaders to learn as much as possible about the key issues we are facing so that we can overcome challenges, identify opportunities and thrive economically."

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“The dynamic changes in our energy sector right now are of major interest to Lubbock businesses, as those changes drive business decisions both short-term and long-term,” Lubbock Economic Development Alliance CEO John Osborne said. “Likewise, agriculture continues to be the cornerstone of our community and an industry that will continue to drive Lubbock’s economy for years to come.”

The two-day conference will feature speakers from throughout the Ports-to-Plains region that stretches from Alberta, Canada to Mexico. Former House Ag Committee Chairman Larry Combest will give an overview of critical issues in agriculture. PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett will discuss the cotton industry’s impact on the Ports-to-Plains region. Representatives from Monsanto and Continental Dairy Facilities Southwest will give updates on their recently announced projects that will be significant job creators on the South Plains.

Energy presentations will showcase the region’s diverse and productive energy production portfolio from oil and gas to renewable sources such as wind and solar. Consul General of Canada Sara Wilshaw will discuss trade opportunities with the United States largest trade partner and northern neighbor, while presentations from Ports-to-Plains partners in Mexico will share the developments in Texas’ largest foreign trade market.

A strong transportation infrastructure is critical to moving the region’s ag and energy products to market, and these issues will be featured as well. Lubbock Mayor and Ports-to-Plains Treasurer Glen Robertson will give an update on efforts to extend Interstate 27. Carolyn Mays, Manager of the Freight Transportation Planning Branch of the Texas Department of Transportation will speak on the Texas Freight Mobility Plan and what it means for the Ports-to-Plains Corridor.

“We are putting together a great agenda that can provide critical insights for our region,” said Reeves.

California Cotton Grower Mark Watte Elected as Cotton Incorporated Chairman

Mark Watte, a Tulare, California cotton producer, was elected chairman of Cotton Incorporated at the joint Cotton Board/Cotton Incorporated Board meeting in December, 2015. Watte, who succeeds outgoing chairman B.B. Griffin of North Carolina, has served as a director on the Cotton Incorporated Board of Directors for over 20 years, and is active in many cotton organizations including the California Cotton Growers and Ginners Association.

Mark Watte is a partner in George Watte & Sons, a 3,000-acre mixed crop farm in Tulare, California. Currently, Watte shares his knowledge and leadership through participation in local organizations, such as: the Consolidated Peoples Ditch Co; the Friant Water Authority; the Tulare Board of Public Utilities; and the Kaweah Delta Water Conservation District, on which he serves as Vice Chair.

Over the course of his career Watte has received numerous recognitions, including: 2000 Tulare Farmer of the Year (an award shared with his brother and business partner, Brian Watte); 2013 Tulare Man of the Year; Tulare County Agriculturist of the Year; and is a recipient of the 2015 High Cotton Award, presented by Delta Farm Press.

Mark Watte and his wife Joanne have been married for more than 42 years, have three daughters and ten grandchildren.

Watte will serve a two-year term as Cotton Incorporated Chairman.
